

## Young emerging regional artists rewarded

Two regionally based emerging artists have been awarded once-off grants to pursue their passion and interest in the arts.

The grants were made available to honour the memory of Anya Machczynski, a former Arts Officer with Country Arts SA.

Daniel Sutherland and Bradley Saegenschnitter both share a strong passion for photography and will be using their grants to further develop their skills, purchase materials and promote themselves as artists.

Daniel, 16 of Kapunda, has shown dedication to his interest in photography, extending his year 11 studies at Kapunda High to include a Diploma of Photography through the Photography Institute. Daniel's already extensive CV includes his work as a freelance photographer and his position at *Salon Rouge* gallery where he indulges his passion for painting and exhibits his work.

"I've been devoted to photography for a long time but my interests have also expanded into painting within the last 6 months," said Daniel.

"I will be using the funds to purchase materials for painting and to fund tuition fees for my Diploma of Photography," he added.

Bradley, 17 of Angaston, discovered his passion for photography through his studies at Nuriootpa High School and is especially inspired by Adelaide photographer Denis Smith.

Bradley's enthusiasm has seen him travel through regional South Australia and New South Wales to capture images and explore lighting techniques.

"I have exhibited my works in the SALA Festival and other public exhibitions which has generated so much positive interest in my work and also some sales," said Bradley.

"I will be using my grant to frame works for exhibition and sale and also to produce business cards and flyers to assist in promoting myself as a photographer," he added.

Carclew received an overwhelming response to this once-off opportunity with a range exceptional applications submitted for consideration.
